Having completed the three months professional and practical internship training program entitled PROJECT MANAGEMENT AND LEADERSHIP PROGRAM (PMLIP), organised and sponsored by the Integrated for all foundation at its Headquarters Secretariat and where the training is purely interactive and participatory with field works ,offered free of charge. We the participants of the 6th batch have the following observation:

- Youths of Cameroon who are supposed leaders of tomorrow are full of hidden, neglected and unexplored talents which have caused them to rely solely on the public

sector with majority of them ending up frustrating in the streets all because they are job seekers and not creators.

- Cameroonian youths are not very productive due to inadequate access to professional and/or practical training opportunities which are more often free or moderate in cost, to enable them gain experience in different fields especially in the field of Project Management and leadership.
- Natural human resources which Cameroonian youths are endowed with, remains unexploited. This explains the reason for the slow economic growth of the country and high crime wave

Considering that the internship course is open to individuals with diverse cultural and academic backgrounds, couple with fact that poverty is commonplace in Cameroon with less privilege affected the most, thereby rendering them vulnerable to diseases especially those in the local communities including orphans and other minority groups. This diversity will help spread the impact of this course across the nation;

We decided as follows:

1. To establish and maintain a network between participants and IHAF to fight against poverty and encourage sustainable development amongst the local communities and young Cameroonians by offering voluntary services in the areas of capacity building on project management and leadership which will have a multiplier effects on the local communities and the state at large and also contribute enormously towards achieving the goals and objectives of IHAF and the millennium development goals.
2. We conferred amongst us and decided to share the skills and knowledge acquired not only during the internship course but what we learnt in school to reduce the chances of misappropriation of project funds both in the private and public sectors
3. To seek support from individuals and donor agencies within and without the country to ensure that the internship course is all-expense-paid for and the capacity to accommodate more participants at a time and even organise international seminars for African youths which could grow into a partnership with some African countries who will operate similar course in their various countries under the supervision of the


Integrated Health for All Foundation which will enhance the status of the organisation and promote African unity.


YOUR CONTRIBUTIONS towards the realisation of these decisions will be greatly appreciated which will serve as a gateway to development for a very productive and self-empowered generation endowed with professional ethics like transparency and accountability and create a good networking between the Government and humanitarian societies for a better tomorrow.
